LEGISLATURE OF 1919.

SENATORS.

BENJAMIN J. AINLAY (Republican), ninth district. Was also a member of the house of representatives during the sessions of 1915 and 1917. Was born in Brussels, Ontario, Canada, of English and Irish ancestry. In 1901 he married Mayme Garoen, and they are the parents of six children. Moved to Nebraska in 1877. Graduated from the Lincoln business college. Is engaged in the real estate and insurance business. Has been justice of the peace at Belgrade for twelve years and a member of the board of education for eight years. Attends the Methodist church. Is a member of the Odd Fellows, Rebecca Degree of Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Elks and Ancient Order of United Workmen. Address: Belgrade.

JOHN DAVID BARR (Republican), fourteenth district. Was born at Hanover, Illinois, in 1858. Ancestors were Irish. Came to Nebraska in 1879 and attended the Pawnee Academy. In 1890 he married Elizabeth M. Morrison. They have five children. Mr. Barr's present occupation is farming. Is a member of the Presbyterian church. Address: Liberty.

THOMAS E. BRADSTREET (Republican), eighteenth district. Was born at Independence, Iowa, of American parents. Has lived in Nebraska since 1903. Is married and the father of two children. Has been a farmer and wholesale mule and horse merchant. Belongs to the Modern Woodmen, Odd Fellows and Masons. Address: Grand Island.

JAMES BROOKS (Republican), tenth district. Was born in Tioga county, New York. His ancestors were English. Married in 1878 and moved to Nebraska in 1880. Mr. Brooks has been a fireman on the railroad and a farmer. Is a member of the Masonic order. Address: Stanton.

BERTON K. BUSHEE (Republican), twenty-seventh district. Mr. Bushee served the state as representative during the legislative sessions of 1909 and 1911, and as senator in 1913, 1915, 1917 and 1919. He was born at Dartford, Wisconsin, but has lived in Nebraska since 1888. Is married and has two children. Received his education in the public schools of Wisconsin. Has been a school teacher, merchant and banker. Is now president of the Citizens State Bank of Kimball. He has been mayor of Kimball and a member of the village board. Belongs to the Methodist church, Masons, Knights of Pythias and Modern Woodmen. Address: Kimball.

CHARLES A. CHAPPELL (Democrat), twenty-second district. State senator, 1917-1919. Was born in Pike county, Indiana, in 1882. His ancestors were English. Came to Nebraska in 1884. Married Eleta H. Pattison in 1917. Practices law. Has been city clerk of Minden and county attorney of Kearney county. Member United Presbyterian church, Masons, Ancient Order of United Workmen. Address: Minden.

J. F. CORDEAL (Republican), twenty-sixth district. Was a member of the senate in 1911, 1913 and 1919. Born in Pontiac, Illinois, 1873. His ancestors were Irish and American. Attended the college of the city of New York and graduated from Northwestern University Law School in 1898. Has resided in Nebraska since 1895. Is a lawyer. Belongs to the Knights of Pythias and the Modern Woodmen. Address: McCook.

JOHN WILLIAM COOPER (Republican), fourth district. Was born in Indiana in 1867. Graduated from the Rising Sun, Indiana, high school. Has lived in Nebraska since 1892. Is a practicing attorney. He is a Protestant and a member of the following fraternal organizations: Masons, Knights of Pythias and Odd Fellows. Address: Omaha.

DENNIS H. CRONIN (Republican), twenty-fourth district. Was a member of the house of representatives in 1911, 1913, 1915 and 1917, and of the senate in 1919. Was born in Michigan in 1869. His ancestors were Irish. He has lived in Nebraska since 1877. Married Kathleen Lorge in 1894 and they are the parents of five children. Mrs. Cronin died in 1911 and in January, 1919, he married Faye Farrand. Mr. Cronin publishes The Frontier newspaper at O'Neill. Was a member of the city council for six years and postmaster for eight years. Belongs to the Catholic church, Elks, Knights of Columbus, Modern Woodmen, Woodmen of the World and Ancient Order of United Workmen. Address: O'Neill.

ANDREW ERICKSON (Republican), twentieth district. Representative in 1913. Born in Norway in 1855. Came to America in 1864, and to Nebraska in 1873. Was educated in the public schools. Married and the father of six children. Mr. Erickson is a retired farmer, and a member of the Lutheran church. Address: Campbell.

JAMES W. GOOD (Republican), twenty-eighth district. Was born in Kentucky, March 10, 1861. His ancestry is American. Received his early education in the country schools of Kentucky and Illinois and attended the business college at Macomb, Illinois. Came to Nebraska in 1884. Is married and the father of four children. Has been a farmer, merchant, rancher, and real estate dealer. He was city councilman for two years. Is a member of the Methodist church and of the following fraternal organizations: Royal Neighbors, Woodmen and Ancient Order of United Workmen. Address: Chadron.

HAMILTON J. HALL (Republican), twelfth district. Mr. Hall's parents came to America from England and Wales and settled in Crawford county, Pennsylvania, where he was born. Came to Nebraska in 1880. In 1882 he married Jessie Simmons. They are the parents of seven children. Graduated from the Grand River Institute, Austinburg, Ohio, in 1875. Has been a school teacher and farmer, but is now retired. Belongs to the Methodist church, Masons and Modern Woodmen. Address: David City.

J. W. HAMMOND (Republican), twenty-first district. State senator in 1917. Was born April 25, 1872, on a farm in Nemaha county, Nebraska. Attended the grade schools and graduated from Cook (Nebraska) high school. Engaged in the newspaper business in 1893. For the past sixteen years he has been the editor and owner of The Cambridge Clarion. Also owns and operates a small farm where he raises pure bred stock. Was a member of the Cambridge city council four years and served on the board of education six years. He was president of the southwest Nebraska editorial association one year. Is a Protestant. Belongs to the following fraternal organizations: Masons, Odd Fellows, Knights of Pythias, Ancient Order of United Workmen and the Eastern Star. Address: Cambridge.

RILEY CLEMENT HARRISS (Republican), fifteenth district. Born at Arthur, Illinois, of American parents. Married Alice M. Hunt in 1911. They are the parents of three children. Came to Nebraska in 1884. Graduated from the high school at Fairbury in 1905. Has been a farmer, school teacher, superintendent of schools and insurance agent. Member Baptist church, Masons (Sesostris Shrine and Scottish Rite, Lincoln). Address: Fairbury.

WALTER VAN FLEET HOAGLAND (Republican), twenty-fifth district. Was senator from this district in 1911, 1913 and 1919. Born in Illinois in 1870 but his ancestors were Dutch, Swedish and Scotch-Irish. Came to Nebraska in

1873. Married Hattie S. Singleton in 1898. Graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1895 and from the law school in 1896. Has practiced law in North Platte ever since graduating. Is a member of the Odd Fellows (Grand Master of the Order for Nebraska in 1917), and Elks. Address: North Platte.

E. C. HOUSTON (Republican), sixth district. Born in Monroe county, Indiana, in 1861, of Scotch-Irish ancestry. Came to Nebraska in 1881. Married Jennie Templeton in 1885. Was educated in the Indiana public schools and attended the university of that state in 1879 and 1880. He was mayor of Tekamah in 1895. Address: Tekamah.

FRED G. JOHNSON (Republican), nineteenth district. Representative in 1907, 1917 and senator in 1919. Was born near Dorchester, Nebraska, in 1876. His ancestors were Swedish. Graduated from the Dorchester high school in 1893 and from the University of Nebraska, college of law, in 1903. He is a lawyer, real estate dealer, and has extensive farm interests. Member Methodist church. Address: Hastings.

RICHARD FLETCHER NEAL (Republican), first district. Member legislature, 1917. Was born at Peru, Nebraska, 1873. Graduated from the Peru normal school in 1894 and from the state university at Lincoln in 1896. Married Mary S. Holland in 1896. Practices law and was county judge of Nemaha county for four years. Member Methodist church, Odd Fellows, Masons (Shriner). Address: Auburn.

C. PETRUS PETERSON (Republican), thirteenth district. Representative in 1915 and 1917, and senator in 1919. Born in Polk county, Nebraska, in 1880, of Swedish parents. Graduated from Luther academy (Wahoo, Nebraska), in 1903; from Augustana college (Rock Island, Illinois), in 1906; from the University of Nebraska, college of law, in 1909. He is city attorney of Lincoln and was county food administrator during the war. Belongs to the Congregational church and is a thirty-second degree Mason. Address: Lincoln.

CHARLES H. RANDALL (Republican), eighth district. Was born at Little Falls, New York, in 1864. Attended the public schools of New York and Iowa. Has been in Nebraska since 1888. Is now vice-president of the Security National Bank of Randolph (Nebraska). Has been mayor of the city of Randolph. Is now and for the past twenty years has been president of the city board of education. Belongs to the Methodist church and was a member of the 1920 general conference. Is a member of the Masonic lodge (Scottish Rite, Shriner). Address: Randolph.

PERRY A. C. REED (Republican), seventeenth district. Representative in 1917. Born on a farm near Monroe, Wisconsin, January 22, 1871. His paternal grandfather was a soldier in the Revolutionary war. Came to Nebraska in 1876. Received his education in the country schools of Nebraska. Married Abbie L. Wescott in 1896. Is a member of the Odd Fellows. Address: Henderson.

JOHN W. ROBBINS (Republican), fourth district. Was born in Jefferson county, Indiana. Came to Omaha, Nebraska, in 1885, after graduating from Hanover college, at Hanover, Indiana, in 1884. Married Isabel Wyman in 1894 and they are the parents of four children, a son and three daughters. Is a realtor and has a general insurance agency. Is a member of the Congregational church, and of the following organizations: Masons, Beta Theta Pi (college fraternity), Omaha Real Estate Board, (president 1907-1909), Omaha Chamber of Commerce, Happy Hollow Club. Address: Omaha.

CHARLES L. SAUNDERS (Republican), senator from fourth district. Born in Mount Pleasant, Iowa, 1857. Educated at Cornell university and Columbia college law school. Came to Omaha in 1861, when his father was appointed governor of Nebraska territory by President Lincoln. Is in the real estate business in Omaha and is president of the Omaha Real Estate Company and of the

Saunders Investment Company. Was supervisor of census for the second congressional district for 1910. Was a member of the state senate in the sessions of 1903, 1905, 1907, 1913, 1915, 1918, and 1919. Member constitutional convention, 1919-1920. During the 1907 session he was president pro tem., acting as governor during the absence of Governor Sheldon and Lieutenant-Governor Hopewell. Is a member of the leading clubs of Omaha and of many fraternal orders, including the Masons and Elks. Address: Omaha.

CHARLES WILBUR SEARS (Republican), fourth district. Born at Onawa, Iowa, in 1872. His ancestors, landing at Plymouth in 1630, were among the early colonists in America. Is married and has two children. Came to Nebraska in 1891. Graduated from Onawa (Iowa) high school in 1891; received the degree of bachelor of philosophy from the University of Iowa in 1897, and graduated from the University of Nebraska law school in 1900. Is a practicing attorney and was nominated by the Republicans for attorney general in 1914. Appointed to membership on the special commission on revenue and taxation in 1913. Elected from Douglas county to and served in the state senate in 1918-1920, elected and served as delegate from Douglas county to the Nebraska constitutional convention in 1919-1920. Member Episcopal church, Knights Templar (Masonic), Elks, Athletic club of Omaha, Chamber of Commerce, Carter Lake club. Address: Omaha.

HARRY E. SIMAN (Republican), seventh district. Born at Winnebago City, Minnesota, in 1869, of English and German parentage. Graduated from the high school at New Lisbon, Wisconsin, and then attended college at La Crosse, Wisconsin. He later graduated from the University of Northwest, Morningside college of law, at Sioux City, Iowa, and has practiced law since 1895. Married May Sullivan in 1889, and they have two sons. Has lived in Nebraska for twenty-two years. Belongs to the Modern Woodmen, Knights of Pythias (grand chancellor of Nebraska, 1912-1913), Masons (Nebraska consistory No. 1, Omaha). Address: Winside.

ANDREW FREDERICK STURM (Republican), second district. Is a native of Nebraska; was born on a farm near Nehawka, in 1863. His ancestry is French and German. In 1890 he married Lola M. McCarthy. They are the parents of four children. Mr. Sturm has been a school teacher, but now deals in coal, lumber and grain. Is a member of the Elks, Odd Fellows, and Masons (Shriner). Address: Nehawka.

JOHN SWANSON (Republican), eleventh district. Was born in Sweden in 1854 and came to Nebraska in 1878. Married in 1883 and has nine children, eight sons and one daughter. Has been a carpenter and a farmer. Was county supervisor of Platte county for one term. Belongs to the Lutheran church. Address: St. Edward.

JOHN M. TANNER (Democrat), fourth district. Senator in 1900, 1911, 1917, and 1919. Was born in Nevada, Iowa, April 13, 1861. Attended the public schools. After learning the printer's trade and working on various metropolitan papers, he started a weekly paper at Atchison, Kansas. He was city editor of the State Journal and of the Commonwealth in Topeka; also correspondent for the Kansas City Times. He came to Nebraska in 1885 and continued in newspaper work as reporter on the Herald, Evening World, and the Bee, city editor of the Nebraska City Press, and was city editor of the Deadwood Pioneer for a short period in 1890. He started the Daily Tribune in South Omaha in 1891. Is now editor of the Nebraska Democrat there. Has been president of the Nebraska press association, Democratic editorial association, secretary of the Nebraska State Aerie, and president of the South Omaha Aerie No. 154. He was secretary of the South Omaha park board for three years. Is a member of the Eagles, the Elks, and other fraternal organizations. Address: Omaha.

W. J. TAYLOR (Democrat), twenty-third district. Representative from the

fifty-eighth district in 1899, 1901, 1909, 1915, and 1917. Member constitutional convention, 1919-1920. Born in Iowa in 1861 of English parentage. Came to Nebraska in 1883. Married Belle Morris in 1882, and they are the parents of three children. He received his education in the public schools and attended Whittier college for two years. Is farming in Custer county. Belongs to the United Brethren Church. Address: Merna.

CHARLES JOSEPH WARNER (Republican), thirteenth district. Representative in 1901, 1903, and 1905. Born in Lancaster county, Nebraska, 1875, of Swedish ancestry. Attended Lutheran academy in 1891-1892, Lincoln normal university, 1894, and graduated from the University of Nebraska in 1899, and from the Columbian law school, Washington, D. C., 1902. Mr. Warner is a progressive farmer and president of the Lancaster Farmers State Bank. Is a member of the Congregational church, Masons (Scottish Rite, Knight Templar), and Modern Woodmen. Address: Waverly.

CHARLES J. WATSON (Republican), sixteenth district. Born in Illinois in 1860 of Irish parents. Attended Wesleyan university, Mt. Pleasant, Iowa, 1878-1879, and graduated from Hedding college in 1882. Married Laura Hafrichter in 1891. They have three children. Has been a farmer and stockman in Nebraska for thirty-eight years. Member of the Masons and Modern Woodmen. Address: Fairmont.

RALPH EUGENE WEAVERLING (Republican), fifth district. Native of Nebraska, Scotch-Irish parentage. Graduated from the high school at Beatrice, Nebraska, in 1903; Northwestern business college in 1904, and from the law college of the University of Nebraska in 1911. Practiced law at North Bend from 1911 to 1918, when he moved to Lincoln. Is now vice-president of the Lincoln Accident and Life Insurance Company. Belongs to the Methodist church, is a thirty-second degree Scottish Rite Mason, Shriner, and a national officer of Alpha Tau Omega (college fraternity). Address: Lincoln.

W. H. WESTON (Republican), third district.

JAMES ALLAN (Republican), tenth district. Representative in 1895. Born in Scotland in 1855, and has lived in Nebraska since 1872. Received his education in the public schools of Scotland and West Point, Nebraska. Has been sidewalk inspector of Omaha for six years, deputy United States marshal for ten years, deputy sheriff for two years, city councilman, city of Omaha, two years, and is now principal of the Allan detective agency. Belongs to the Presbyterian church, Chamber of Commerce, Woodmen of the World, Masons (Knight Templar, Shriner). Address: Omaha.

CHARLES F. ALLEN (Republican), thirty-fourth district. Was a member of the legislature in 1913-1914. Born at Stafford, Connecticut, in 1856, of English and Irish ancestry. Came to Nebraska in 1882 and married Migrete E. Patton in 1887. Mr. Allen sells real estate and insurance. Address: Beatrice.

FRANK ANDERSON (Republican), forty-fourth district. A native American, born in Page county, Iowa. Came to Nebraska in 1880 with his parents. Graduated from the Aurora high school in 1892. WILLIAM J. ANDERSON (Republican), thirty-seventh district. Born in Westmorland county, Pennsylvania, July 2, 1877. Came to Butler county, Nebraska, in 1888. Attended the public schools. Has been engaged in general farming and stock raising, in the grain business, insurance and real estate. Member Butler county agricultural association, and of the Odd Fellows. Address: David City.

JAMES A. AXTELL (Republican), thirty-second district. This was Mr. Axtell's second consecutive term in the legislature. Elected as a "dry" in 1917. Born in Athens county, Ohio, January 13, 1870. Moved with his parents to Nebraska in the same year. He was educated in both public and private schools. Mr. Axtell taught school fourteen years, engaged in the real estate and insurance business for ten years and is now farming and raising pure bred cattle and hogs. He is a member of the Methodist church and of the following fraternal orders: Masons (Knights Templar, Scottish Rite), Elks, Moose, Odd Fellows, Modern Woodmen of America. Address: Fairbury.

ALVA AVERY BAKER (Republican), sixteenth district. Born in Greenville, Pennsylvania, 1860. Ancestors were English. After graduating from the high school at Greenville he attended the state normal at Edinboro, Pennsylvania. He came to Nebraska in 1885. Married Nelli Ayers in 1891. They have three children. Teaching and farming have been his occupations. Belongs to the Methodist church, Modern Woodmen of America, and the Degree of Honor. Was a county official for four years. Address: Winnetoon.

W. M. BARBOUR (Republican), seventy-fifth district. Born in Fulton county, Illinois, in 1860. Came to Nebraska in 1865, lived in Nebraska City and Lincoln until 1870, and then on a farm in Cass county until 1887. Took a homestead in Scotts Bluff county and still resides there. Has been actively identified with irri-

gation development since the beginning of irrigation construction in his county. Has been president of the board of directors of Enterprise ditch, chairman of Nebraska Irrigation Association, and chairman of the Associated Irrigators for six years. Served as county commissioner for two terms. Now president of the Independent Lumber Company at Scottsbluff. Address: Scottsbluff.

HENRY BEHRENS (Republican), twenty-second district. Representative from the twenty-second district in 1917 and 1919. Born on a farm in Benton county, Missouri, in 1864, of German parents. Educated in the public schools of Missouri. Came to Nebraska in 1880. Married Elizabeth Silla, and they have two children. Has been a farmer and is vice-president of the First National Bank of Beemer. Member Lutheran church. Address: Beemer.

LOUIS BERKA (Republican), tenth district. Born in Bohemia. Attended high school at Flint, Michigan, and graduated from the law college of Michigan university in 1883. Married Zella Remington in 1878. They have eight children. Has lived in Nebraska ever since graduating from university, and is engaged in the marble business, sells real estate and practices law. Was justice of the peace, police judge, city councilman of Omaha. Belongs to the Christian Science church, Masons (Knight Templar, Shriner), Knights of Pythias, J. C. B. J., and Woodmen of the World. Address: Omaha.

WILLIAM W. BETHEA (Republican), fifty-third district. Born in Mahaska county, Iowa, in 1855. His ancestors were French Huguenots, who fled to England in 1572. John Bethea came to America in 1630 and settled in Virginia. W. W. Bethea is one of the seventh generation of the family in this country. He attended the public schools in Iowa and the Oskaloosa business college (now Drake university). Came to Nebraska in 1880 and homesteaded in Holt county. Married Emma J. Davies in 1887. They are the parents of seven children. Mr. Bethea was in the hardware and grain business in Iowa for four years, but has been farming since coming to this state. GEORGE ASA BIRDSALL (Democrat), thirty-third district. Born at La Grange, New York, of American parentage. Came to Nebraska in 1879 and attended the high school at Hastings and Hastings college. N. M. NELSON (Republican), nineteenth district. Representative in 1903. Born in Denmark in 1855. Came to Nebraska with parents with a colony of Mormons. Parents became dissatisfied and left the colony, settling at Florence. Attended private and public schools of Omaha. Taught school in Stanton county, Nebraska, for six years.
